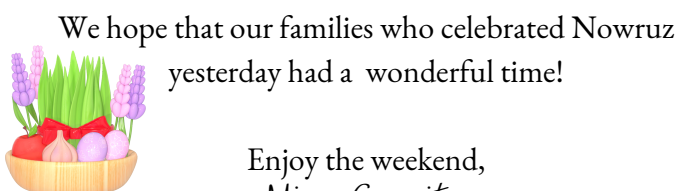

What Three Questions?

Nursery
